A Message from David

There is a powerful hymn that is very appropriate for the church to sing in this January/ February time of year: "In The Bleak Midwinter". The poem/ hymn begins:

"In the bleak mid-winter Frosty wind made moan, Earth stood hard as iron, Water like a stone:

Snow had fallen, snow on snow, Snow on snow,

In the bleak-mid-winter long ago."

My old professor, Dr. John H. Leith, once wrote that when he first heard the hymn, he did not much care for it, for it seemed too melancholy (especially as a Christmas carol, which it, in fact, had become.) However, upon further reflection, Dr.Leith came to think of the hymn as most definitely a Christmas carol, and one of his favorites to boot! For though the carol begins with the harsh imagery of "the bleak mid-winter", that imagery reflects accurately the barren and bleak circumstances that can, and often do, come crashing into our lives much like a winter storm can bring the normal flow of life to a stand-still.

But the hymn does not leave us stranded in the bleakness of a frozen landscape. It moves forward.

"Our God, Heaven cannot hold Him, Nor earth sustain; Heaven and earth shall flee away when He comes to reign: In the bleak mid-winter A stable-place sufficed The Lord God Almighty, Jesus Christ."

Though our world was just as bleak and barren of love and neighborly kindness some two thousand and twenty or so years ago, as it is barren and bleak today, never-the-less Jesus was born on Christmas Day; and through His coming to our broken and spiritually dark world, the very Light and Life and Word of God came into our world full of grace and truth.

As the New Year begins, we are still facing the barren and bleak circumstances of Covid-19; political and racial disunity; and dangers to our society from within and without. Nev- er-the-less, Jesus Christ is still with us and for us, Jesus Christ the Emmanuel, The "God is with us" man, will see us through "the bleak mid-winter" into the "spring" of the Light and Life of a new life lived in His will and way for us.
