Kymn of the Month—provided by Rose Ann Burgess

What Wondrous Love is This

This folk hymn is from the American South, not far from Fincastle. The lyrics were first pub-

lished in Lynchburg in 1811 in a camp meeting songbook, A General Selection of the Newest and Most Admired Hymns and Spiritual Songs Now in Use. Although the hymn's text was thought to be by an anonymous writer, it was later attributed to a Methodist minister from Georgia, Alexander Means.

The melody is from a popular English ballad. In earlier years hymn texts were sung to secular tunes that everyone loved to sing. This particular tune was a 1701 English song, "The Ballad of Captain Kidd." Since people loved many secular tunes, this hymn



was sung to many popular tunes of the day. The text and melody were first published together in the appendix of the 1840 edition of *The Southern Harmony*, a book of shape note hymns compiled by William Walker.

In 1966, *The United Methodist Book of Hymns* became the first standard hymnal to include *What Wondrous Love is This.* It is now included in most hymnals of Christian denominations including our own.

The song's lyrics express awe at the love of God and are reminiscent of the text of John 3:16.

Orange Brownies

from the kitchen of Dot Langford

Oven 350 degrees. Cook 30 minutes

- Ingredients:
 - ♦ 11/2 cups all purpose flour
 - ♦ 2 cups sugar
 - ♦ 1 teaspoon salt
 - ♦ 1 cup (2 sticks) butter, softened
 - ♦ 4 eggs
 - ♦ 2 teaspoon pure orange extract
 - ♦ 1 teaspoon grated orange zest



- Glaze
 - ♦ 1 cup confectionery sugar
 - ♦ 2 tablespoon orange juice
 - 1 teaspoon grated orange zest



- Grease 9 x 13 pan (glass)
- 2. Mix together flour, sugar, extract and orange zest and beat till well blended
- 3. Pour into pan and bake 30 minutes
- 4. Remove from oven and pierce top with fork
- 5. Pour glaze over and spread
- 6. Cut into 20 or 24 pieces
- 7. Share and Enjoy!

Congregational Book Review and Recipe

STILL LIFE

A mystery by author, Louise Penny Submitted by Lynne Bolton

As a lover of mysteries since my mom read Nancy Drew mysteries to me as a little tyke, I was delighted to have some friends suggest the Louise Penny mystery series set in Canada. The first book in the series, <u>Still Life</u>, was enjoyable, and it intro-

duced most of the characters who, it turns out, play important roles in almost all of the future books. I have been hooked ever since!

The main character, Chief Detective Inspector Armand Gamache of the Sûreté de Quebec, is a seasoned and thoughtful head of that homicide department. When called to a tiny village near the Vermont border with Quebec to investigate an unlikely murder, the reader is exposed not only to characters with interesting stories of their own, but to an almost magical village which isn't even shown on any Canadian maps! Who could have killed the well-loved former schoolteacher? Was it merely a hunting accident, or was it a cold-blooded ambush? As the reader follows Gamache's highly skilled team through the steps of determining who killed Miss Jane Neal, the reader is drawn into a wonderful little town with its many personalities.

Louise Penny doesn't just "tell an interesting tale", she slowly develops each of her characters over this mystery series. Some have found <u>Still Life</u> "a little slow" when reading it for the first time, but Penny is drawing you into the lives of the people of Three Pines, Quebec, and she is presenting the many layers of each person's life and character. Armand Gamache is the main character throughout the series, and you become part of his family (both his personal family and his Sûreté family).

I highly recommend this series for any mystery lovers, but please take note: READ THE BOOKS IN PROPER ORDER! Penny introduces new aspects or experiences of her characters in each book, and they grow upon and depend upon things that have happened in the preceding book. Reading out of order can not only be confusing, but it can also be a real spoiler of the storyline.

A Message from David—"A Look Back at Sain"

In recent weeks Iain Maclean's name has come up in conversation with members of the church. First, Patsy found a book owned by Iain in our church library (in fact, almost all of the books in our library came from Iain's personal library!) In another conversation we talked about Iain's tenure at JMU as a full-time professor even as he was the pastor here at FPC. That particular achievement by Iain has amazed me since I first heard of it. So, after reading this tribute to Iain written by one of he JMU colleagues and friends, I can now better understand how me was able to be both a university professor and the minister with a pastor's heart here at FPC. Pleases read the JMU tribute to Iain and remember his amazing life and work with gratitude, and with thanksgiving to God for Iain's presence and work among us.

lain was an effervescent presence in our department, beloved of students and faculty alike – certainly for his keen wit and self -deprecating humor – but also for his genuine love of people and a selflessness evident in his profound kindness and generosity to all who came in contact with him.

Behind lain's endearing shambolic ways and twinkling eyes was a brilliant, extraordinarily learned man. He had language facility in Afrikaans (a dialect of Dutch), Dutch, Zulu, German, Portuguese, and French, as well as ancient Hebrew, Greek, and Latin. Born to Scottish parents in Durbanville, South Africa,



as a young man lain entered the University of Cape Town, graduating with degrees in English and Greek in 1976. Sensing a call to Christian ministry, he went on to earn his BD degree (equivalent to the Master of Divinity in the U.S.) in New Testament and Theology at Rhodes University, subsequently receiving his ordination in the Presbyterian Church of South Africa. In 1985 he earned a masters degree in theology at Princeton, a year later a further bachelor's degree in Greek and Latin from the University of South Africa, and then in 1996 his doctorate in theology from Harvard Divinity School.

During his time in South Africa, Iain also served two years as chaplain in the South African

Army, at the rank of colonel. It is perhaps a little known fact that during his training lain qualified as a sharpshooter. Years later lain had his Browning rifle shipped to him, and – in a classic "lain moment" that those who know lain will immediately recognize – after picking it up at Dulles Airport ambled through the terminal holding it.

After graduating from Harvard Divinity School in 1996, Iain held visiting professor positions at Roanoke College and Washington and Lee University. In 1998 he was appointed to his position at JMU, where for nineteen years he taught courses in the department on the history of Christian thought as well as a range of courses on religion and society. Iain served as the Department's pre-seminary advisor and tirelessly supervised many students in their religion internships. He also became famous university-wide for his "High Teas", his attempt to bring some British class and culture to his North American colleagues.

We also remember lain as a man of deep Christian faith. He was one of the once common but increasingly rare breed who seamlessly combined in his own person and professional life love for the academy and love for the Church. As a student in South Africa he was involved in groups such as Youth for Christ, and while a Th.D. student in Boston he pastored and revitalized an inner-city church that had been decimated by "white flight". Over the past ten years, in addition to working full-time as a professor, he served tire-lessly as minister in the Presbyterian parish in Fincastle, Virginia, preaching weekly,

founding and leading a youth group, and visiting his parishioners.



Dietrich Bonhoeffer described Christ as "the man for others." *Iain Maclean was a man for others. We will miss him. May he rest in peace.*
