Fincastle Presbyterian Church Report from Palsy and David

David and I were lucky to have the opportunity to travel to Montreat Conference Center to attend the Wee Kirk Conference. Wee Kirk means "small church". This is a conference designed for "small churches". It is primarily ministers, music and worship leaders and spouses. It is a lovely conference and this year's topics were very interesting. I attended the Creative Worship and Music sessions and David attended the Mission sessions.

Over the next several months, the Worship Committee and I will be incorporating some different hymns and ways to use hymns during worship. For example: last Sunday, we sang the Bible School song "Zacchaeus was a Wee Little Man" and this Sunday and the following 2 Sundays we will be singing verses from a hymn that some of you may be familiar with, but I wasn't. It is called "The Servant Song" or "Let Me Be Your Servant". We will be singing a verse each Sunday during the time of collection for the Thanksgiving Food Collection. Here are the words to the first verse:

> Will you let me be your servant, Let me be as Christ to you? Pray that I may have the chance to let you be my servant too.

Think about the words as you sing them. As we donate to others, we are serving as their servant and maybe one day, that same person may be in a position to share or be our servant.

Here are some other thoughts with which I could relate:

- \Rightarrow The preacher's job is to remind us (the congregation and himself) of the things that we need to remember as we go out and serve God.
- \Rightarrow Incorporate music into liturgies.
- \Rightarrow During Stewardship Season, people should share personal stories about why the church needs money (remember the Stewardship Season is upon us).
- \Rightarrow Memorizing verses from the bible can be very engaging
- \Rightarrow The worship service should aspire to honor God by engaging hearts, building community and it should be a place where we can practice living faithfully.

- \Rightarrow We need to share leadership responsibilities
- \Rightarrow We should minister to one person per week
- ⇒ Thanksgiving is approximately 20 days away and Christmas is only about 51 days away! Think about that!
- \Rightarrow We all need to be open to try new methods and ideas during worship———- stay tuned :)

While Patsy was attending the "Creative Worship and Music" section of the Wee Kirk Conference at Montreat (short for "mountain retreat", btw!), I was attending the Missions section of the conference. Our theme was : "1,001 New Worshipping Communities", which is a mission effort by our Presbyterian denomination, PC(USA), to start at least "one thousand and one" new worshipping communities throughout the U.S.A. and its territories.

Many things were discussed, but the one concept that most captured my imagination was the idea that in order to bring new members into our worshipping community, we must reach people where they are in our community.

That concept then begs the questions: who are the people in the community that surrounds our church and where are they in life? and what are their needs?

Another related idea was the hard reality that our traditional form of worship may not speak to, or appeal to, the younger generations. More informal music and fellowship oriented worship experiences seem to be well received by the younger folk. An example is nearby: The Wild Goose Church that meets mid-week at Peace Presbyterian Church in Bonsack.

As I mentioned, several other mission ideas were discussed, but these are the ones that spsoke to me most clearly.

My sincere hope for our dear Fincastle Presbyterian Church is that we will continue to reach out to our community and meet their needs to worship and serve God.

He would listen intentionally to the great Christmas Carols: "Away in the Manger", "Silent Night, Holy Night", "Joy to the World, etc. He would study the lyrics and allow the beautiful melodies to carry him back to his memories of his childhood or some earlier chapter of his long and full life. He would rejoice in the secular world's display of decorations and Christmas Cards. He would join in the general spirit of giving that goes with this time. For God is the Author of every "good thing! And the Christmas Season is a very good thing.

By God's grace may we enjoy the holy days (the holidays) that are upon us.


