

"Today we visited a school on a very remote mountaintop. It took 2 hours in a jeep going 10 mph on a road I can't even describe. Let me just say we got a flat tire. The children have many hardships. We met with the teachers and they shared the challenges they face. The support from New Communi-

## ...from David's Desk

I've heard it said that "missions begin at home:, and, there is a great deal of truth in that saying. The church's efforts to relieve suffering in a foreign country would mean little if we ignore the needs that exist across the street or in our own "backyard".

At the same time, while Christian missions may begin at home, Christian missions can not end there. Christ Himself has sent His church out into all the world. In the closing verses of the Gospel According To Matthew, Jesus gave to his disciples "the Great Commission": "And Jesus came and said to them, 'All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything that I have commanded you. And remember, I am with you always, to the end of the age'."

Part of what Jesus has taught His church, and then calls us to teach others, is Jesus' command to us: "to love our neighbors, even as we love ourselves". In this part of the Great Commandment the church has always heard Christ's command to relieve the suffering of our neighbor, both near and far, both "at home", but also "in lands far away", indeed throughout the whole world.

Some of us respond to Jesus' command by volunteering in "Soup Kitchens" and "food pantries" that serve our neighborhoods. Others of us may board a plane and fly halfway around the world, like Lori, to help young women escape the curse of "human trafficking". The Christian mission to relieve human suffering has its work to do both at home and throughout the world. Through prayer may each of us seek and hear and answer Christ's calling to us to be the means of God's grace to our neighbor both near and far.
