Some would say that my father, Eli Dickerson, was not a good singer. But, I would say that Dad could be a very good singer! When he was alone in his basement lawn-mower repair shop, Dad would occasionally belt out a few phrases and lines from some old ballad or gospel hymn. He would sing from his heart when he would sing one of his favorites: "I Am A Poor Wayfaring Stranger".

The opening lyrics to one version of that old ballad went like this: "I am a poor wayfaring stranger, I'm travelin' through this world of woe".

My father could identify with that "plaintive traveler" and his/her journey through this "world of woe". I can imagine that: you and I can also identify with that traveler. We can turn-on the news and hear:

On a personal level, if we are honest with ourselves, our own personal failures and sins only add to "this world of woe".

There is much about the "hard realities" of our journeys through "this world of woe" that would convince us that all of our journeys will end badly. That decay, destruction, and death will speak the final word for ourselves, for the world, and even for the universe itself.
