- Mark your calendar for 2¢ A Meal Sunday, coming up on May 7! What do you know about the origins of this Special Offering? The Two Cents-a-meal concept originated with Presbyterian women to provide an opportunity for individuals and families to participate in a corporate response to world hunger. In November 1975, Florida resident Rosellyn Calvert, whose own family was struggling financially, asked God what she could do to help those suffering from hunger and poverty around the world.

She was led to give just two cents a meal. The Calvert family committed to each give two cents, and in April of 1976 Rosellyn shared the concept with her presbytery. Today, most presbyteries encourage the contribution of two cents (or more) per person at each meal, reminding individuals, families and groups each time they eat of the needs of others and our call to respond as Christians to their hunger. Daily participation is a reminder of the reality of hunger for millions of our sisters and brothers in the world. \$.02 * 31 days = \$.62 per day per person in each family for one month.

The Story behind:

Pass It On

If you are a baby boomer, raised in the church, and born in the late 1940s or 1950s, you probably grew up singing Kurt Kaiser's "Pass It On" around a campfire or at youth group meetings.

Kurt Frederic Kaiser (1934–2018) was born in Chicago. He received his musical education from the American Conservatory of Music and Northwestern University (B.M., 1958; M.M., 1959). Mr. Kaiser "joined Word, Inc., in 1959 as director of artists and repertoire, and later became vice president and director of music for Word, working with them until 1989.

He resided with his wife, Pat, in Waco, Texas. They had four grown children and ten grandchildren. Kurt Kaiser was an active churchman, serving as a founding member of DaySpring Baptist Church in Waco, offering an alternative vision for Baptist communities.

While known primarily for his youth musicals, Mr. Kaiser is an accomplished pianist and has written music for a variety of performing media in varied styles. He has composed more than sixty hymn texts and tunes, the most famous of which are "O how he loves you and me" (1975), and "Pass It On."

Mr. Kaiser provided the background to "Pass It On," one of his most famous songs: "In 1969, Ralph Carmichael and I collaborated on a musical, Tell It Like It Is. It was written to get young people involved in the Church. After reviewing what we had written, we decided there needed to be a closer, a modern 'Just As I Am' [a hymn by Charlotte Elliott written in 1835, and a favorite of Evangelicals for altar calls].

"On a Sunday night I was sitting in our den by the fireplace where there were remnants of a fire, and it occurred to me that it only takes a spark to get a fire going... and the rest came very quickly. My wife suggested that I should say something about shouting it from mountain tops, and that ended up in the third verse. It only took about 20 minutes to write the lyrics. Afterwards my wife and I went for a walk, letting the song ruminate in our minds."

Since 1976, the song has appeared in at least nine other hymnals in the United States, England, and Canada.

The Story behind:

This Is My Father's World

Maltbie D. Babcock revealed his great admiration for nature in this lovely hymn Text. He was recognized as one of the outstanding Presbyterian minister of his generation. He was also a skilled athlete who enjoyed all outdoor activity, especial his early morning walks. He would always comment, "I'm going out to see my Father's world."

Since he was an accomplished performer on the organ, the piano and the violin, we can see why nature seemed to him to be "the music of the spheres." In addition to being a tribute to nature, however, this hymn is a triumphant assertion of the unfailing power of god and the assurance Christ's eventual reign—" and earth and heav'n be one."

As we follow Dr. Babcock's example and give praise to God for all the beauty of His world, we cannot help being concerned that much of the loveliness is being destroyed by human carelessness and greed. The real answer to our ecological problems must be a renewed appreciation of earth as "our Father's world" and a greater responsibility for taking proper care of it. Christians should be models of this concern.
